
Malyon houses three Centres which are at the national forefront of writing, networking and training in several key areas. At the Malyon Centre for Transforming Work (which we call Malyon Workplace) we understand that most Christians don't work in churches. In fact, most Christians spend most of their time in their workplace, wherever that happens to be – in an office, a hospital, a school on a construction site, in their own business or in a mine!

But many Christians are not sure how to live out their faith deeply and effectively at work. They are not sure how to connect their faith with their daily workplace issues. And they are not sure how their work makes any difference to God.

So Malyon Workplace offers coaching (seminars, mentoring, conferences, roundtables), a community (of Christians committed to engaging with issues of work/faith integration) and resources (check out **www.malyonworkplace.org.au**). 


